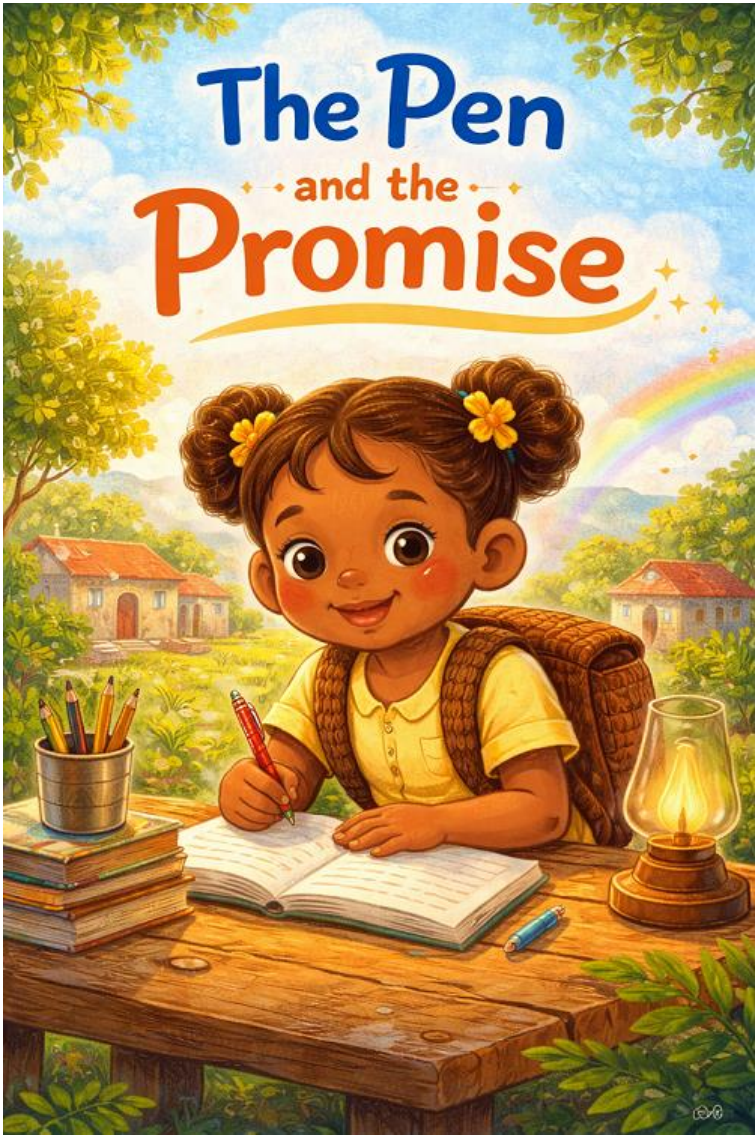


The Pen and the Promise FOR LOWER PRY CEM READ AND SPELL

Some sums made her head feel tired.

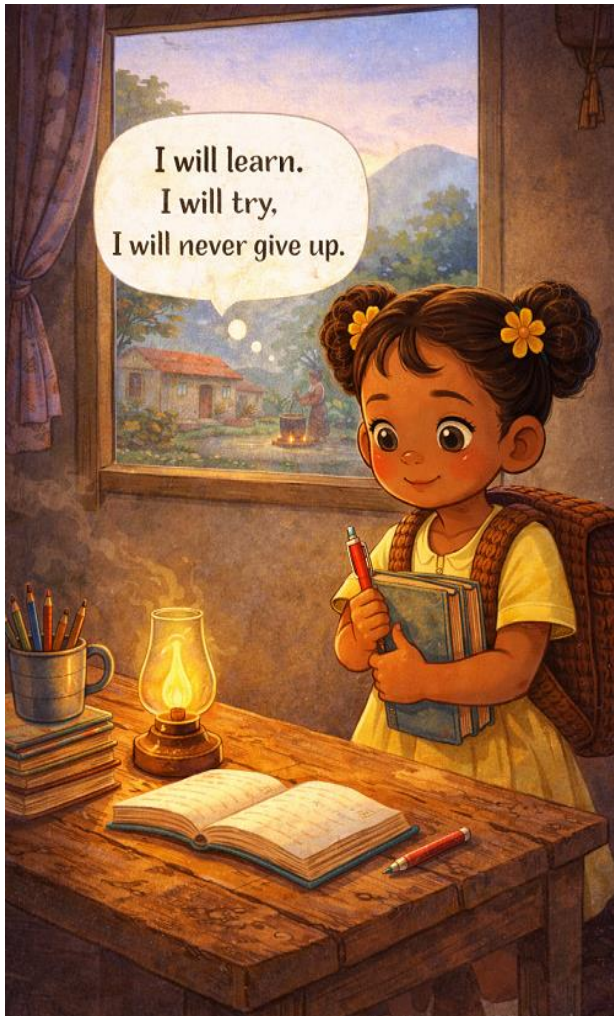
But Aisha stayed **patient**.

Integrity means doing the right thing, even when no one is watching.

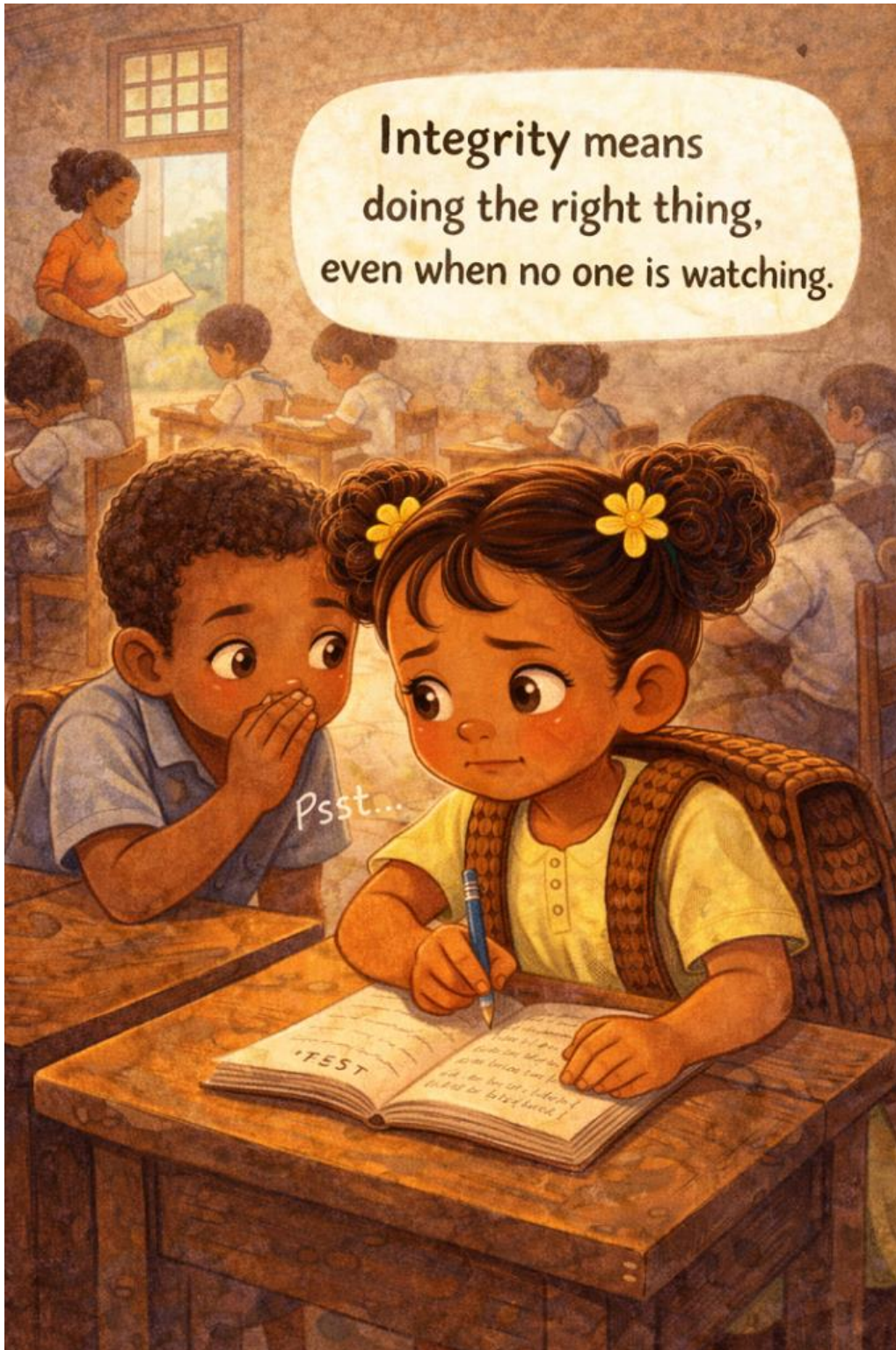
When the teacher collected the books,
